The Lost Dogs' Home currently provides pound services to 17 metropolitan councils, across two shelters.

2015/16 Cat Admissions

Total Incoming	10685	
Rehomed	3134	29.33%
Reclaim	988	9.25%
Euthanasia	6015	56.29%
Other	517	4.84%

In 1999/2000 total cat admissions were 8,020.



Initiatives employed by the Home since 1999/2000


- Free pet ID tags
- Low cost microchipping
- Increased and upgraded cat shelter
- Adoption campaigns
- Working with rescue
- Social media campaigns
- Increase in costs to councils and reduction in cat trapping services









A six month snapshot of which cats are desexed.

What does this all suggest?

- We cannot identify, register, reclaim and adopt our way out of the volume of unwanted cats.
- Traditional population control approaches have not had the long term desired effect.
- Traditional animal management and sheltering approaches are not in the best interests of cat welfare.



The affect on staff

- Many long-term employees in shelters
- On a daily basis must make life and death decisions about animals they have a high level of empathy for
- It's dangerous and difficult dealing with semi-wild cats
- But it's the volume of in-between, healthy, shy and semiowned cats that are the most troubling
- Community expect council and shelters to be proactive.



Desexing is key to reducing shelter admissions and community cat populations.

The ASPCA have been running mobile-low cost desexing units from 2002 for cats and dogs. Between 2002 and 2007, the euthanasia rate at NYC Animal Care and Control dropped from 74% to 43%. Other factors also contributed to this drop, but acknowledge 'common sense would indicate that Mobile Spay/Neuter Clinics have played an important role by removing from the breeding pool over 54,000 animals...'*




But equally key is identifying;

- What group of owners are not desexing their cats and,
- What is preventing them from desexing their cats?







Our assumption was this was primarily;

- Cost
- Accessibility
- Education in part but more around benefits of early desexing



With the barriers in mind we thought about how we could reach more cat owners.

- Applied to the Victorian Animal Welfare Fund Grants
 Program for a grant of \$50,000
- Refurbished an under-utilised Winnebago we had for microchipping
- Established a costing model that could appeal to owners and councils







What does the Home contribute;

- Online booking system and phone bookings/support for cat owners.
- Appointment reminder via text, email or phone call.
- Waitlist to maximise the number of cats desexed.
- Onsite desexing service in your municipality.
- If required, volunteers to target specific area through door knocking and letterbox drops.
- Desexing and microchip certificates and post-surgery information the same day.
- Option to return to local area 14 days later to remove stitches and provide other advice and ad hoc support.
- Microchipping services for desexed pets



What do the Councils contribute

- Flat well serviced area in their municipality usually Council offices
- Power and town water
- Support with promotion social media, website, flyers/posters
- Identifying specific owners in need




What do the owners and their cats receive

- Highly experienced vets and vet nurses
- Same medical protocols used in our shelter or public vet clinics
- Juvenile surgeries on kittens from 8 weeks
- Maximum age 8 years
- A team that values the opportunity to support pet owners with services, advice and information
- Can do attitude!







Achievements to date

- Desexed 470 cats (249 Females, 217 Males)
- 10 events across 23 days
- 9 in 10 received free microchip
- Worked with 4 Council partners
- Appear to be hitting our target owner



Most importantly we estimate

4,080 less kittens will be born in the next 12 months







What's the impact of less kittens born?

- Less wild and semi-wild cats living on the streets and suffering
- Improved cat welfare over all in the community
- Reduced threat to wildlife
- Perhaps improved value of cats
- Help carers of semi-owned cats take proper ownership



What's the impact on owners?

- Desexed cats are happier and healthier
- Less likely to exhibit unsocial behaviours such as spraying and roaming
- Make better pets, facilitating stronger bonds with their owners
- Therefore less likely to be abandoned
- Value in the companionship of pets for individual and community well being.







What's the value for our council partners?

- Less complaints
- Reduction in cats impounded
- Reduction in animal management costs to council
- Opportunity to incorporate other messages such as registration
- Enhanced relationships with residents
- In line with community expectations of a more proactive approach and less euthanasia



Learnings and Feedback

- \$50 per cat seems the right price point
- Over half of the cats desexed were over 6 months old.
- Female spots book out first, often reduce males to fit more females
- These owners unlikely to go to a private vet clinic two thirds have not vaccinated their cat



Learnings and feedback continued;

- A council reported a greater take up of the low-cost desexing event than low-cost vouchers for vet clinics
- Open and positive mind dealing with owners, try to reduce their barriers to desexing and offer them solutions – or the cat will not be desexed
- Our staff really motivated to do the events, positive solutions have meant a lot
- Choosing the right vehicle is important







Learnings and feedback continued;

- Keep the service model simple, desexing only works best
 no upselling
- Cats need to be healthy, under 8 years of age and over 8 weeks
- Focus on cats
