

# Cyclone and flood emergencies

The Western Australian State Emergency Service (WASES) is the Lead Combat Authority for both cyclones and floods occurring in Western Australia. This means that the agency is responsible for ensuring that all activities related to the prevention of, the preparedness for, the response to and the recovery from these emergency situations are taken. But not necessarily all performed by members of the WASES.

The WASES currently operates without the force of legislation to discharge its responsibilities. Therefore, it relies heavily on the cooperation and good will of the agencies who work with it during emergencies. As an agency it cannot compel anyone, not even its own members, who are almost all volunteers, to do its bidding.

Dealing with farm and companion animals during cyclone and flood emergencies can create significant difficulties for emergency services personnel. Whilst the priority will always be to minimise the loss of life and suffering of people recognition is given to the important role played by farm and companion animals in the lives people.

The presentation will:

- outline current policy in regard to animals during cyclones and floods;
- describe the present advice given to animal owners for emergency situations;
- highlight the difficulties faced by emergency services personnel in dealing with animals; and
- explore possible improvements which could be made in present arrangements.
