The seventh National Urban Animal Management Conference represents an evolution which has seen many changes in style content and organisation. This process has been driven largely from the delegate questionnaires which are completed at the conclusion of each year's conference. In this way we seek to improve each year.

This year marks the first formal joint venture between a state body and the Urban Management Advisory Group. The Municipal Law Enforcement Officers' Association (MLEOA) of Western Australia and the Urban Animal Management Advisory Group (AVA) joined together to host the 'Joint Solutions' conference. This is an exciting venture because it provides a closer linkage between the state in which the conference is held and the topics presented. It also gives numerous speakers a good career opportunity to present the excellent work which various groups are doing in the locality. In essence this started last year with a very close link through the SA Dog and Cat Management Board under the daily guidance of Ken McCann. This year takes the process further with a formal linkage with MLEOA. It will be continued next year with the Local Government Association of Queensland.

The issue of cultural attitudes to animal ownership should also shed light on the complex nature of the human/animal bond and help better understanding between all groups within our communities. In the process it will help solve daily problems in urban pet management.

The unstinting work of Graeme Raine and Brian Watkins for MLEOA will be appreciated by all delegates. Finally the excellent coordination and professional work of Doreen Culliver and her team at AVACOS has allowed this conference to proceed and these proceedings to be in your hands now.
