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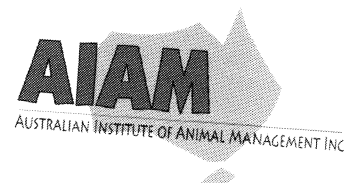

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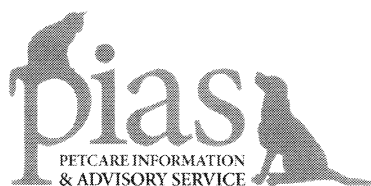


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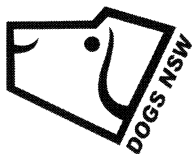

It is probably true to say that working out the "why and how" of Animal Management has taken *every bit* of the past twenty years of *doing* annual national


