- Community cat management discussions and potential pilot project







Highlights to date



- Over 2 years in operation
- Significant milestone of 2845 cats desexed
- 55 events, 13 Councils and 2 Rescue Groups
- 90% cats receiving identification microchip
- Events BOOKED OUT in advance

Working with Councils: Cluster/heat mapping





- Stray collection data

- 6. Huge potential






















Community Cat Management

Community Cat Management



1. 17 shelters in the USA:

 Community Based Cat Management Programs (CBCMP) significantly reduced cat intake numbers

2. Critical

- Community engagement
- Volunteer network, Colony carers
- 'Neighbourhood cats partner' (M/C)
- High volume, streamlined desexing
- Support from Council, animal welfare organisations, community and Government

Community Cat Management



- 1. Discussions:
 - Design 1 or 2 CBCMP models
 - Private property multiple cat permits
 - Apply for exemption
- 2. In-house research
- 3. Funding considerations
- 4. Council partners
- 5. Pilot a program
- 6. Evaluate the successes
- 7. Report back to Government
