

- Includes domestic animal (pets) and animal welfare policy, legislation, licencing and audit, and grant and education programs to support animal welfare




















IMPACT STATEMENT

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of these Regulations are to implement the purposes of the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act 1986 by:

- prescribing procedures for application for and issuing of permits to conduct rodeos and rodeo schools
- prescribing conditions to be met for conduct of rodeos and rodeo schools
- prescribing procedures for application for issuing and transfer of licences for scientific and breeding establishments and certificates of registration as an experimenter
- prescribing minimum standards and conditions at scientific and breeding establishments
- prescribing procedures for submission of annual returns of animal usage by registered experimenters
- prohibition of certain scientific procedures.

2. OUTLINE

The proposed regulations:

- (a) revoke the Protection of Animals Regulations 1981 and all the amendments, and re-state similar provisions in consolidated form.
- (b) introduce several new requirements relating to the use of leghold traps, operation of rodeo schools and the licensing of scientific establishments and breeding establishments.

Regulations proposed under paragraph (a) prescribe:

- . standards for the operation of rodeos
- requirements for the registration of experimenters on a basis of three years registration
- requirements for experimenters to provide information about the scientific procedures using animals undertaken by them.

Regulations proposed under paragraph (b):

- set the standards for large and small spring-operated steel-jawed leghold traps
- . prescribe standards for the operation of rodeo schools





The Prevention of Cruelty of Animals Act is a recent Government initiative, and the Act cannot be brought into operation until the Regulations are made.









Bugs Bunny loved them. But did you know, carrots are a sometimes treat and not an everyday food for your pet rabbit?
